Our Mission Statement



Federally Delegated Environmental Regulation

Regulatory jurisdiction of tribal lands is administered by the Tribe and the Federal Government. In the case of federal environmental laws, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) proclaimed "Indian Policy" on November 8, 1984. The policy has two major elements. First, EPA or tribes, rather than states, should implement federal environmental statutes on Indian lands. Second, where it is authorized, EPA will cooperate with and assist tribes in developing and implementing tribal programs under federal environmental statutes.

The Morongo Environmental Protection Department was established in 2004. Authorized by Morongo Tribal Ordinance # 12, the department is seeking such delegation to administer sections of the Clean Water Act, the Clean Air Act, Recourse Conservation and Recovery Act, and the Endangered Species Act that will have the backing of federal law.

The goal for both EPA and the Tribe is to build the Environmental Protection
Department's capacity so that the Tribe can administer sections of the federal programs which ensures federal compliance and reinforces the Tribe's sovereignty.

Environmental Protection Department Programs

Under Tribal Council's direction, the Environment Protection Department has developed the following programs: air, water, pollution prevention, resource conservation, and the Native American Internship Program. In order to better serve the communities needs, the following services are provided.
