Native American Preference Internship Program

Purpose—

To Provide an opportunity for Native American High School Students to explore professional work experience in the Environmental Field.

Who May Apply—

Morongo Band of Mission Indians is an equal-opportunity employer. We do, however, give preference to Native Americans, as allowed by federal law.

Determination of Eligibility—

- Be in or entering High School
- Have a fundamental concept of natural resources and environmental science
- Be able to work in an outside and inside environment
- Be able to provide a parent or guardian signed liability waiver and photo release

Time Commitment—

Students will commit to 18 hours a week for 5 weeks in June and July. Students will be expected to arrive promptly and work for the duration of their shift from 9am to 4pm with an hour lunch. Students will complete 90 hours to satisfactorily fulfill the internship requirements.

Activities—

Students will work both in the office and in the field helping environmental specialists in the various department programs.

Intern Responsibilities

Daily activities may include:

- Data collection
- Data management and entry
- Outdoor clean ups
- Waste audits
- Collect, prepare, and present environmental information
- Attend meetings and trainings pertinent to their assigned duties
- Work independently on a project of their choosing

Deliverables—

Students will complete an individual project of their choosing, related to the Environmental Protection Department Programs. Students will conduct research and prepare a written report on their topic and potential solutions. In addition, students will present their project to the Morongo Community on the final day.

Provisions—

Upon satisfactory completion, all students will receive a certificate of completion certifying volunteer hours worked. Students may receive High School credit (as approved by a counselor). It is the student's responsibility to arrange the credit fulfillment with their school.
